A NEED FOR UPDATE

- Pharmacist education and training has transformed drastically since the Iowa Pharmacy Practice Act's last major update nearly 40 years ago, including doctoral level PharmD training since the 1990s.
- Unlike other health care practice acts in Iowa, the Pharmacy Practice Act strictly regulates the drug supply chain, the physical pharmacy location, AND the individual pharmacist.
- Pharmacists are the only health care professional with bright-line legislation governing their professional practice. Updating the practice act will give lowans access not only to the pharmacist, but to their full training and education.
- Pharmacists provide clinical services in a variety of practice settings. Decoupling clinical activities from the pharmaceutical supply chain allows for patient- and practice-specific decision making.



CUT RED TAPE ON PHARMACISTS' ABILITY TO TAKE CARE OF PATIENTS

- The current Iowa Pharmacy Practice Act is over 28 pages. The modernized draft is only 17.
- Other jurisdictions, including Idaho and Colorado, have modernized pharmacy practice to allow pharmacists to practice at the top of their training.¹ IPA's modernized draft includes language from Idaho.
- Pharmacists stepped up during the COVID-19 pandemic through regulatory flexibilities, allowing for a range of patient care services in various practice settings.²
- Cutting red tape on the individual pharmacist as a health care professional facilitates efficient decision making and closes the gap in access to patient care services.



MAXIMIZE IOWA'S HEALTH CARE WORKFORCE

- Nearly 9 of every 10 Americans live within five miles of a pharmacy, making pharmacists the most accessible member of the healthcare team.³
- Updating the Pharmacy Practice Act will attract talented professionals to lowa, create
 efficiencies across practice settings, and allow pharmacists to meet patient needs close
 to home.
